CoA ESOL Instructor Dr. Didem Ekici to present at UN Symposium



Non-credit ESOL Program: How to Reach More Students

How can we reach more students who need our classes but never think of enrolling in college? The ESOL department has an answer: instead of bringing students to the college, take the classes to them!

The ESOL Department piloted two sections of its new off-site Bridge to Credit Program in fall 2018. ESOL 541A, the first course in the four-course noncredit sequence, was offered at two community sites in the Fruitvale area of Oakland — Las Casas English as a Second Language, an evening ESL program for adults, and Spanish Speaking Citizen's Foundation, a non-profit organization that offers a variety of services that range from immigration services to workforce development.

The Noncredit Bridge to Credit ESOL Program was developed as part of a district-wide effort to support ESOL students in the Northern Alameda County region. We found that even interested students who have already been studying English at adult schools and community-based organizations face barriers that prevent them from attending the Peralta colleges. With Adult Education Block Grant funding and the support of our regional ESL design team, we outlined a noncredit program that would streamline the pathway from adult school or community-based ESOL to credit ESOL at the Peralta colleges.

Our program consists of a series of four short-term intensive courses designed to better prepare ESOL students for credit classes. Each course covers a broad life-skills topic and integrates technology to support student development of digital literacy. Curriculum was backwards-designed from the lowest level of credit ESOL at Peralta and addresses pedagogical gaps identified by adult school instructors.

In its first term, the noncredit program has over 60 students enrolled with new students attempting to enroll each week. Our student population varies from individuals with emerging literacy to professionals who have earned university degrees in their countries. Several students have already attempted to enroll in classes at the Peralta colleges, but faced challenges due to inconsistent work schedules, inexperience in a rigorous academic environment, misinformation about residency requirements, and cost. However, the free, repeatable, pass/no pass Bridge to Credit program provides those students an opportunity to continue their studies and consider enrolling in credit college courses. In fact, some of the more advanced students have already observed credit ESOL classes and will apply for credit ESOL courses in the spring.

Noncredit courses have one especially significant advantage for non-resident students – per SB 68, hours of attendance in noncredit courses count towards proving residency in California. As a result, non-resident students who complete the equivalent of a one-year, full-time noncredit program will qualify to pay in-state tuition (\$46/unit) instead of out-of-state tuition (\$213/unit). In addition to improving their proficiency in English and computer literacy and being eligible to earn a noncredit certificate of competency, a full-time student in the Bridge to Credit program will be completing hours towards proving residency and paying considerably reduced in-state tuition fees for their credit classes.

Going forward, the ESOL department will continue to serve students in our region by building and maintaining relationships with our community partners. The noncredit program has expanded this spring with two sections of ESOL 541B and one of ESOL 541A. Our current group of students is projected to complete the full noncredit sequence and earn the first noncredit ESOL certificates in spring 2020

We both found the campus to be very relaxing. It must be all of the redwood trees and fresh air. Before leaving we visited the Arboretum where I saw a rufous hummingbird for the first time. It's an incredible place to behold, like UCB bot garden but more open and accessible (and free). Inside UCSC the students are happy to share their research work. I even reached out to a Chemistry professor at UCSC, Rebecca Braslau, who went to Reed college as an undergrad with Peter Olds. We met at the transfer day and Rebecca showed us her research that I find very interesting. Her group is synthesizing a non-toxic additive to replace a toxic additive in PVC plastic (pipes). . . I find the MESA program a useful resource for many reasons such as field trips, guest speaking events, internship opportunities, tutoring and peer support. Student's Corner: COA MESA Student Accepted to CCARE Summer Research Internship at CSU Monterey Bay

CoA student and MESA member **Thomas Greathouse** has been accepted to the UROC Community College Apprentice Research Experience (CCARE) program at CSU Monterey Bay. Congratulations Thomas! We'll share his words on the matter:

"I'm really looking forward to summer apprenticeship CCARE at CSU Monterey. I learned about this internship after having missed deadlines for the big Berkeley internships which were

really much too overproduced to apply (I couldn't keep up with all of the updates and deadlines). It shouldn't be that hard! Frustrated but not disheartened I was emailed by a MESA instructor about CCARE and wanted to apply after reading about the projects. I reached out to the chemistry PI directly through email early on. Her response was positive and 5000 words later I was in! My advice to prospective students is to reach out directly and make a connection. Going through the main channels is often limiting what you can say because you must answer to prompts and a real conversation is lacking. That said it is also good practice to write to prompts as well as this will hone your ability to communicate your interest creatively.

This will be my first time in research and I love field work having worked on an organic blackberry farm as my first job out of high school. I'm familiar with farming techniques as one of my passions is growing vegetables. I run a student club at Laney, "Friends of the Laney Garden Club". After a long week of hard work studying it's nice to do some gardening to maintain balance. We're really needing members this semester as interest has gone down. The Laney garden is a great place to meet cool people in a constructive way. We sent our soil to a lab for testing almost two years ago for a CAM-17 listed metals test in the interest of safe gardening. We gardening organically but there was a question as to the origin of the soil itself. The results were interesting.

As for research I will tell you a little about the apprenticeship. The project is a joint effort involving a bioreactor that uses bacteria to break down anthropogenically introduced phytotoxins, biotoxins and excess fertilizers from the agriculture watershed. Environmental Science is researching the macroscale impact of these chemicals in the aquatic life. Biology is sequencing DNA of specific strains of these bacteria to keep tabs on who's who in the reactor. Chemistry is analyzing the water."

The UROC Community College Apprentice Research Experience (CCARE) program provides community college students the opportunity to conduct research at CSU Monterey Bay for 9-weeks over summer. Projects are available in a variety of STEM disciplines. They explicitly welcome students with no research experience! We enthusiastically encourage you to apply next year!"




