
Join us for this fun and informative day of learning about sustainability, recycling, and bettering our planet!



## In Memory and Honor

As both a former student and current head of the CoA music department, I feel it only fitting that I offer some insight and reflection on the important legacy of William "Bill" Bell Jr., the recently passed former head of Music at CoA. Bill Bell was hired in 1970 as head of the Music Department for the then budding two-year-old College of Alameda campus. With only limited facilities at his disposal, two adjoining portables located in the parking lot next to the tennis courts, he crafted what would come to be an impactful and renowned music program, attracting students from throughout the Bay Area.

Bill challenged his students to realize their potential and believed strongly in the power of expectation. However, imparting high standards of music theory and performance were not his only objectives. He also cared deeply about the development of his students as people and, along with his insistence on discipline and excellence, had the ability to personally connect with them as well as often with their family members.



I can personally attest to this as from my first encounter and lessons with Bill Bell at age twelve until shortly before his passing, he remained as an advisor and mentor. Even as I embarked upon my own career pursuits, which included

work as a Broadway musician and conductor as well as musical director for the Boys Choir of Harlem, he continued to impart wisdom and knowledge on how to best address and resolve musical performance issues as well as those that often arise from the politics surrounding the music industry. Nonetheless, generations of Bill Bell's students have become highly respected musicians and educators, many of them achieving national prominence in both performance and academia.

While in recent years, support for Music, and Arts education in general, has wavered, there are those, including myself, that are firmly committed to preserving and advancing its importance as a pathway to academic achievement and personal enrichment.
