CoA MESA Student Nick Fontaine Is Enthusiastic About Learning



CoA SLOACs: New AMS A-OK!

On February 28, 2019, CoA's Student Learning Outcome and Assessment Coordinators (SLOACs) offered faculty a how-to on CurricUNET, the district's new Assessment Management System (AMS).

Student Services SLOAC **Evan Schloss** led the special session, an introduction to the new non-instructional assessment module.

Evan, the CoA Health Services Coordinator, headed up the district effort to develop the section of Peralta's AMS in which counselors, librarians, and nurses will document their assessment work. Joined by instruction-side SLOACs **Andrew Park** and **Matthew Goldstein**, Evan gave the attendees in A 232 a step-by-step tour of the AMS that replaced Taskstream last semester. The new system promises greater user-friendliness and smoother integration among unit plans, program reviews, and course outlines of record.

The three SLOACs will present another hands-on Curriqunet workshop, open to instructional and non-instructional faculty alike, at the March 21 campus flex day—check the forthcoming schedule for time and place.

Financial Aid Social Events Help Promote Priority Application Deadline

The Financial Aid Office held two social events to promote the March 2, 2019-20 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)/California Dream Act Application priority application deadline. These fun and informative events helped raise student, staff, and faculty awareness about the deadline.

The Ice Cream Social and the Popcorn Social events took place on February 21 and 25, 2018. Students had the opportunity to check in with the financial aid staff about their current financial aid and 2019-2020 FAFSA/Dream Act Application status. Most attendees reported that they had not yet completed their application. These students were provided a hands-on workshop schedule along with a flier highlighting that they might qualify for up to \$17,500 in grant funds that would not need to be paid back.

During these events, in addition to receiving expert financial aid guidance, students enjoyed tasty treats, played games, and won prizes. Overall more than 250 students, staff, and faculty walked away with vital information about the priority application deadline. The social events were a great success!

One final note is that even though the March 2nd priority deadline has passed, students may still fill out their 2019-2020 FAFSA/Dream Act Application. Please continue to remind and encourage our students to do this as soon as possible.


